Dearly Beloved,

Greetings to you in the name of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ!

August 10, 2025, First Sunday after the Feast of Transfiguration

Scriptural Readings:

OT: Deuteronomy 25:13-16, 1 Samuel 2:31-36, Ezekiel 7:1-4

NT: James 4:7-5:6, Philippians 4:8-20, Holy Gospel- St Matthew 21:28-32

Holy Evangelion, St Matthew 21:28-32

²⁸ "What do you think? A man had two sons; and he went to the first and said, 'Son, go and work in the vineyard today.' ²⁹ And he answered, 'I will not'; but afterward he repented and went. ³⁰ And he went to the second and said the same; and he answered, 'I go, sir,' but did not go. ³¹ Which of the two did the will of his father?" They said, "The first." Jesus said to them, "Truly, I say to you, the tax collectors and the harlots go into the kingdom of God before you. ³² For John came to you in the way of righteousness, and you did not believe him, but the tax collectors and the harlots believed him; and even when you saw it, you did not afterward repent and believe him.

Reflections:

Who doesn't like stories? In a way, stories make our life, especially through childhood. Storytelling is an art. All of us can share wonderful stories if we put our heart and soul into them. As a story is rolled out, the listener's mind sketches an image or landscape to enliven the characters and the situation. Stories attract everyone, no matter what age. Several stories are told through movies, plays, literature, poems and arts. One can either like or dislike stories depending on the content and the way of presentation. Those with an interest to know more or those seeking more joy or solace or who maybe keen to spend time with ones they love would actively engage in listening to a story.

How are stories usually shared? From parents to children, among peer groups, movie makers tell stories of novelty, great orators include stories to catch the attention of hearers, and sometimes, a painting or sketch can also convey a lot. Stories evoke emotions just as music does. Bedtime stories are not just tales, but they become the most comfortable beds. Some would say, there is no question or purpose in stories if they are make-beliefs and require acceptance without doubt. However, in querying more as we listen to any sharing we will find a purpose to it.

Jesus knew what the people were looking for. They needed refreshing and hope. He wanted

them to stay curious and active. His question at the start, "What do you think?", evoked the crowd. It made their hearing more focused, vigilant and more responsible. Children and grownups listened intently.

A query can always alert mind. Whether we like to be questioned or find it hard to raise questions, without them, life would be less inventive and curious. Asking what, when, where, why, who, whom... would lead to inventions, findings, solutions and knowledge. We appreciate the current academic setting that equips pupils/seekers to ask for reasons and purposes. Great philosophers and gurus were keen to enable their disciples to be inquisitive and develop a mind of reasoning.

Questions can sometimes put us in the role of judging or critiquing. When children sit in the role of a judge during their play they switch to high spirits. Look at the judgements made by ordinary people who assume the judicial seat. They may have their ways, limits, flaws, preoccupations, but when they judge, they do it with a mindset that may not yield to such human flaws. Hence Jesus said, do what those who are seated on the seat of Moses say, not to follow their actions. It is the power and precision of judgement role.

By posing a question prior to the parable of two sons, the greatest Guru was asking his hearers to judge what would be right with the will of God in situations human life be put in. It was not just making a judgement but to stand with it and to practice the same in their life. Jesus wanted the people to know that doing the will of the Father was most necessary regardless of how they responded to His call. Jesus promised the disciples thrones of judgement as their reward for their mission. Why? Because they had to use good judgement in everything they would see, think, talk, hear, guide and act. They had to holistically understand each situation. They had to assure righteousness and be just in everything that involved them.

Jesus commanded to seek His Kingdom and righteousness first and everything would be added to us. He was not referring to self justice, but to the Kingdom of God. They had to live the Kingdom values purposefully and intentionally, free from bias, justice or correctness of personal choice. The parable of the two sons and His question of 'what you think' should serve as a norm for us to feel, be aware and to live as responsible citizens of the Kingdom of God. We are placed in various life situations to carry out responsibilities as unfailing servants/ambassadors of God. After hearing the parables, they chose the son who did his father's will as right. What judgement it could be when the most perfect Son was giving them two examples, in which both the sons pained their father whereas this storyteller, the Only Begotten Son never. While we live, we do with a self judgement, taking the example

from neither of the two, but only from the 'Son' who was obedient unto the death on the cross and resurrected in glory. May the Spirit of the Lord guide us and empower us.
